The secret is the tight deadline, which forces you to lower your expectations, take risks, and write on the fly. You'll quash your inner editor and write for the sheer joy of it.



Already November?

To reach fifty thousand words in November, you need to average about 1,667 words per day. Some Wrimos (NaNo writers) have written upwards of 8,000 words in a day, and a few authors have written all 50,000 words in a single week!

Though you can sign up for NaNoWriMo as late as November 30th, the sooner you dive in, the more likely you are to succeed.

In 2011, authors in the Spokane
Region wrote 5,614,174 words
during November and finished in the
top 25% of all regions world-wide for
total words written.
